The 2023-2024 fiscal year was a year of growth and resilience for the Benzie Transportation Authority (BTA), marked by strong performance and exciting new developments. BTA celebrated a record-high ridership and achieved significant staffing milestones, all while continuing to adapt to challenges. BTA's commitment to improving service efficiency and meeting community needs helped drive overall success. Here are some of the key highlights from the year.

BUSBITS



Ridership grew 11% from the previous year, while miles and hours rose modestly by 4.5% and 5.7%, reflecting improved service efficiency.

OUR STAFF!

BTA reached a staffing milestone, finishing the year with nearly 50 employees.

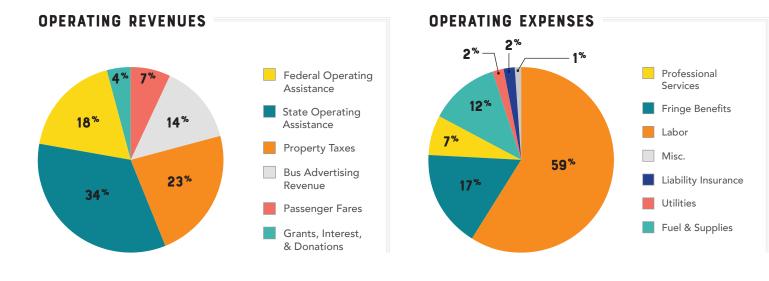

WE NEED MORE THAN FARES FOR FUNDING.

Increased ridership, resulted in a 6% rise in fare revenue over the budgeted amount. The 5-year financial forecast highlighted the need for more sustainable funding, particularly as state operating assistance diminished with the expiration of CARES Act funding. In response, the BTA Board of Directors decided to seek an increase in its operating millage and placed the question of a new 1.0-mill rate on the August 2024 ballot. The measure passed, and the new millage rate will take effect on January 1, 2026.

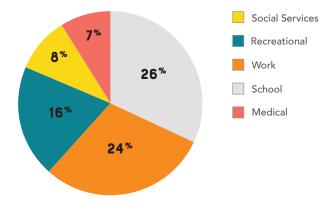


FINANCIALS FISCAL YEAR 2024

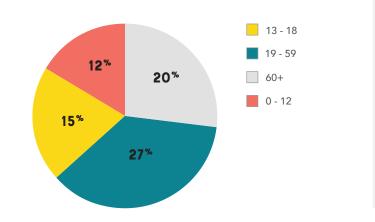


2024 TOP 5 TRIP PURPOSES

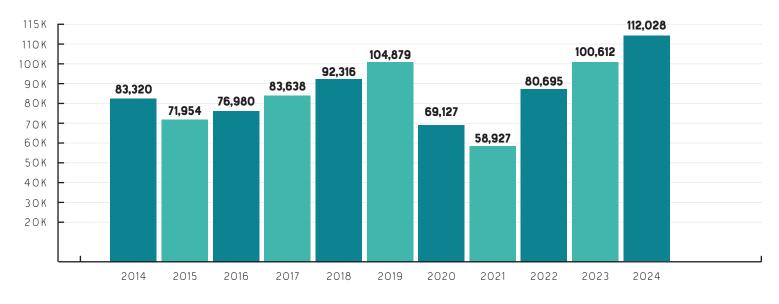
34% of trips have a direct impact on the local economy (work, shopping)

GRANTS AWARDED
